As a 10-year member in 1990 I was not feeling good about my chapter and resented the time I was spending for, apparently, no return. I got the *Harmonizer* and *Mid'l Antics*—but the conventions and trips and schools and special shows just didn't seem all that worthwhile. I stopped attending on a regular basis and grew farther and farther away from the chapter and its members.

And then one day I got a call inviting me to become an Area Counselor. My wife said, "Why not give it a try? You might like it!"

Of course, she was right. The situation was the same as when I had joined a gym, full of excitement and optimism over losing weight, shaping my body, and enjoying my "golden years" in the bloom of good health. For a while I kept going and the good results accumulated.

But in short order life intervened and my regular attendance became infrequent. In a matter of months, my weight was up. I began to resent the money I was spending for not much gain. My attitude towards the gym in particular and fitness in general took a nosedive. I seriously considered cancelling my membership. I sat down and

I discovered something many others knew: My membership in SPEBSQSA was a ticket to a wide world of harmony, fellowship, and fun — just as my gym membership was a ticket to fitness and health. No one could tell me how much to do or not to do. It was up to me. But if I wanted to get my money's worth for my dues, I had to choose to get engaged. And as soon as I did, my world changed forever.

Thave the honor of serving as your District VP of Music and Performance for 2011. Let me introduce myself: I am a 30 year M-AD Barbershopper. I am also a certified Singing Judge, proud member of the

North Pennsmen Barbershop Chorus (2008-2010 Atlantic Division Champions) and I sing baritone in Escapade (a 2010 District Finalist quartet). I hope to get to know many of you over the coming year.

In preparation for my new role, I reviewed the programs for which I have stewardship. I thought that I would take this opportunity to tell you about each of them and invite you to develop a plan for how you and your chapter and/or quartet can participate in them.

Did you know that our District holds a school each year in the early part of January to help our top District level quartets qualify to sing at the International contest? The school, called Top Gun, is an all-day coaching session for a select group of quartets, organized

by Ron Knickerbocker. He brings in some of the top coaches in our Society to help our quartets improve their performance. Having great District-level quartets is good for all of us. As we prepare for our annual shows, it is wonderful to have the option of hiring a high-quality local quartet vs. having to go outside the District where our costs are significantly higher.

Did you know that our District offers assistance in identifying coaches and paying for some of their expenses if your quartet or chorus gets coached? What a deal! Why offer something like this? The best way to enhance a group's performance is to get coaching on a regular basis. It takes someone from

the outside looking in to help identify the largest improvement areas as well as to propose ways to address the issues. As a judge, I have many opportunities to coach quartets and choruses. It always amazes me that each of the groups learns something new — not necessarily because I have provided some new revelation, but because I said the same thing in a different way and it resonated with someone. We all learn differently and sometimes we become a bit "immune" to listening to the same things from the same individual (your director). When a "suitcase" walks in the door, reception sometimes magically improves.

Our **Music Assistance Service Program** identifies potential coaches that you may choose to use — see the link for who they are: http://134.192.106.33/mad/?Code=Coaches. This list is not exhaustive and if you want to use someone else, that is OK. Once you have chosen a coach, check out what you need to do in the way of paperwork: http://134.192.106.33/mad/?Code=MAS

You can get reimbursed for up to \$75 for each of a maximum of 5 coaching sessions in 2011 if you choose to take advantage of this awesome program. Our coordinator for this program is Chuck Lower. Please contact him (chucke80@comcast.net) if you have questions or would like to get started.

This year we have a *special treat*. Our CHAMPIONSHIP CHORUS, the ALEXANDRIA HARMONIZERS will be in attendance to give a master class on Saturday, June 18 just after lunch. This is one golden opportunity. *Don't know what a master class is?* It is a learning session featuring top choruses or other top vocal groups demonstrating what they do to achieve musical excellence for their ensemble. I have gotten numerous ideas as a result of these kinds of sessions. Whatever the skill level of your group, you will walk away with insights that you can use to improve. We are blessed to have an organization like the Harmonizers in our District and I am awed that they have agreed to show us how they move towards musical excellence right at our own Harmony College East — WOW! Thank you, Harmonizers.

Our very capable Dean is Ron Knickerbocker, ably assisted by Scott Ward. Please contact either Ron (*rgkbari@comcast.net*) or Scott (*pslward@msn.com*) for more information. And there's loads of additional information on HCE elsewhere in this issue. I look forward to seeing you there.

Did you know that our District offers your quartet or chorus a service to assess the quality of your group's performance package — this can be your annual show, your holiday show or any performance from retirement community performance to local community event? The program is called Standing Ovation.

Performing for the public is a part of who we are and what we do. We all know that each chapter and each quartet has expenses for uniforms, music, learning tracks, rehearsal hall rental, director's fees, coaching fees, etc. We can either pay for all of these expenses out-of pocket or charge admission to our performances to raise the money to pay

them. Most of us do the latter. If we choose to perform in public, we need to have an objective way of evaluating our performances. Some groups have the resources to record and critique their performances and then develop plans for driving improvement. Some quartets and choruses may not have the tools or capabilities to self-analyze. The Standing Ovation Program was developed some years ago as a way for quartets and choruses to obtain a voluntary review and set of recommendations for achieving a higher level of performance.

How does it work? You invite a certified reviewer to attend one of your performances. He/she takes notes starting in the parking lot (asking questions like, Was there easy access for patrons?) and ending in the parking lot (Was it easy to get out of the facility after the show?). The reviewer shares his observations of how the audience perceived your performance with you and your leadership team and offers ways that your show might be made even better than it already is. Our Standing Ovation Program coordinator is Bill Colosimo. If you would like to schedule a review, please contact him directly (billcatps@aol.com).

Did you know that our District has one of the best schools in the entire Society each summer? I have been involved as both a participant (was coached in both a quartet and chorus) and as a *(continued on next page)*



It all starts with learning

... and the Society offers a wealth of opportunities

Ilive on Long Island where the inhabitants often mutter that we should secede from New York State and form our own state. Chapters from the South can perhaps

sympathize with these feelings. Albany takes our money and then doles it out in great heaps to the people upstate.

Many members of my chorus feel something similar. They complain that our dues money goes to Kenosha (they forget we moved to Nashville) and all they get in return is this magazine with articles about barbershop superstars. Little do they realize that there are valuable things available for their bucks if they would simply find out about them. The society affirms that membership is **priority number one**, but we, as directors, know that people only join choruses that sound good. It is we, the directors, who make it that way. Investing time and money in you and your chapter is bound to help it grow. Here are a few things you may wish to suggest your chapter pursue:

Outstanding In Front — This exciting leadership program isfor anyone who literally "stands in front of your chorus." Often, a well-meaning member of your chorus will address the ensemble in very negative terms. He will have the best of intentions but will use words that discourage rather than encourage your singers. The object of this coaching session is to show the leaders of your chapter how to build the chorus and support your efforts. This program is presented for you at your chapter. You invite the coach to work with you, your section leaders, your assistant director, the program vp, the librarian, the person who makes the coffee, really anyone who stands in front of the chorus.

All these programs involve some cost, usually minimal. The presenters charge no fee, but you need to provide transportation, meals and lodging (if necessary). For this program, you will need a classroom; and you need to print out the workbook.

CDWI 1 and 2 — This program is a **conductor's workshop** designed primarily for "frontline" directors. Limited to five directors, it is designed to meet your specific needs. You can ask to be a part of this program no matter how little experience you have directing. I was amazed how comfortable I was made to feel. We laughed a

lot, even at our own mistakes. You can arrange to have this program at your chapter if you are willing to host it, or travel to another site. It does involve a fee. It is a full day of intensive work. After a three-hour talk session with the two facilitators, you get to work out your ideas and techniques with a live chorus. You are video taped and consult in private with one of the

presenters afterwards. If you choose to present this program, you will need to provide a chorus, recording equipment, a rehearsal room, a small conference room with a video screen with playback ability.

The Next Level — This program is for the entire chapter. To start off, you must submit a video recording of your entire chapter meeting, which means everything, not just the rehearsal but the visiting beforehand continuing through the socializing afterwards. I was surprised that The Alexandria Harmonizers used this program. I always thought that these programs were for small chapters like my own. I guess if you want to grow, you take advantage of all the society has to offer. This is a two-day program and will involve the expense of hosting a trainer. Your whole chorus should buy into this program ahead of time.

Harmony College East and Directors College — Harmony College East is three days long, low cost and near by with an outstanding coaching faculty. It's one of the best values around.

Director's College at Harmony University in Missouri is a week long and chock full every minute. The first time I went to Director's College, I got a scholarship and the chapter paid for my plane fare. I'm not going to try to sell you on the merits of this wonderful experience, but I am going to reiterate the word **scholarship**. You need to apply for this.

As the new VP of Choral Director Development, I invite you to participate in these programs — they are worth the effort!

teacher/coach and can personally vouch for Harmony College East. It is one of the best barbershop experiences that you can have. This year, as in prior years, the school will be held at Salisbury University in Salisbury, Md. from Thursday, June 16 to Sunday, June 19. The school has a large number of course offerings each year given by highly qualified instructors. It is also a place where your quartet can be coached by some of the finest

quartet coaches in our society. Does your chorus get outside coaching? If not, here is an opportunity to have your entire chorus come to the school. They will get some outstanding coaching and can also take some of the courses that will be offered. I hope I haven't frightened you off! It's not all coaching and studying – there is lots of informal time to meet new friends, get re-acquainted with old buddies, sing some songs, sing tags (one of my favorite things to do) and have a great time away from the day-to-day pressures that

exist in each of our lives.

We are blessed to have so many ways to help ou members sing better and perform at higher. As we continue to improve, our audiences will enjoy us even more than they already are and anyone visiting our chapters is much more likely to want to join us. Will your chapter be successful in 2011?

Only you and your fellow barbershoppers will be able to answer this question. However, the two key components that are needed are a strong

music team working in close harmony with a strong administrative team. Three new M-AD VPs will help you on the music team side — John Santora (Contest & Judging), Ig Jakovac (Music & Performance), and Maurice Debar (Chorus Director Development).

What about the administrative side of things? That's where the CSLT team comes into play. In close coordination with the four Division Vice Presidents (DVP) – Jere Richardson (Southern), Don Myers (Western), Neil Keihm (Atlantic), and Oley Olson (Northern), the team is here to provide you with great chapter support and leadership training, with primary emphasis on the later in the November-December timeframe at the Leadership Academies (LA). The team is ably supported by the Chapter Counselors (CC). Each chapter has a counselor assigned for direct support. If you don't know who your CC is, please contact your DVP or me for that information.

M-AD currently has 95 chapters; however, the Society Board of Directors and staff consider that a chapter should have at least 12 members to be considered effective, therefore M-AD effectively has only 87 chapters. Forty-two chapters sent at least one person to the recent LAs. That's about 50 percent, — not bad for batting averages, but not good enough to ensure effective M-AD chapter administrative teams for 2011. OK, there may be some repeating officers who didn't attend, but are they aware of Society changes for their offices that have occurred since they last attended LA?

Let's look a little deeper at who attended. Three of the most important chapter positions may be the:

• VP Chapter Development (CD - Membership) - the lifeblood of

our Society,

- Secretary the guy that keeps all our records and applies for our show clearances and pays the appropriate ASCAP/BMI fees, and
- Treasurer who maintains our finances and keeps us out of trouble with the IRS.

How did those attendees fare? VP CD – 17 (19.5 percent), Secretaries – 17 (19.5 percent), and Treasurers – 18 (20.7 percent). Maybe these figures help to explain why M-AD is down about 188 members since December 2009, and why there were issues in 2010 regarding proper show clearances, show fees, and IRS reporting. To counter this low attendance and allow more Secretaries and Treasurers to get up to speed — particularly with respect to changes that will occur from 2010 to 2011 — a half-day Secretary's course and a half-day Treasurer's course are being planned for the 2011 Harmony College East curriculum.

M-AD can, however, be proud of the fact that overall the 2010 LAs operated in the black, and great feedback reports were received regarding their facilities, food, and facilitators

Have you been out to the Society website and looked at the Resources/Document Center section? There's a wealth of knowledge there to assist all chapter officers, especially Secretary, Treasurer, and VP CD. The manuals and exhibits are not updated yet for 2011, but I expect those updates to occur early in 2011 after new insurance and ASCAP/BMI show fees are established. In addition, M-AD VP Membership Christian Hunter has established a MAD Membership Matters Discussion Group at *madmem@yahoogroups.com*. He always welcomes new members.

Remember that the CCs, DVPs, and I are only an email or phone call away if you need administrative help. If we can't answer your question, we'll get the answer and get back to you expeditiously.



Chuck has been an inspiration and mentor to me in my growth in the judging program, and I expect that I'll have occasion to call on his expertise and guidance a few times over the next little while.

Youth participation increases seven-fold at district workshops

Harmony Foundation and Mid-Atlantic Endowment Fund come through!

- 7,034 students and 190 teachers participated in 39 youth harmony workshops (1045, 34, 12, respectively, in 2008)
- 267 students (9 choruses) competed at the midwinter youth chorus festival in Pasadena, Calif. (6 choruses in 2008)
- 73 chorus directors and 15 music educators attended Harmony University on scholarship
 - 22 collegiate quartets were awarded competition scholarships to attend Harmony University
 - 870 students, 69 teachers, and 260 society members participated in the college quartet tour by Ringmasters

ENOMB

- 27 quartets competed in the Collegiate Barbershop Quartet Contest in Anaheim
- 16 Harmony Explosion Camps involved 1,457 students and 38 music educators
- \$450,000 was distributed in support of youth education, outreach, and scholarships to Harmony University
- \$178,000 was also distributed to chapters and districts to support local efforts. This was possible through donors who elected the "donor choice" option to designate up to 30 percent of their gifts to be returned to chapters or districts or both.



The Harmony Foundation supports those aspects of our hobby about which we care the most — youth outreach and chorus director development. Highlights from 2009 can be found in the figure at the left:

In spite of tough economic times, last year your Mid-Atlantic District Endowment Fund sent four chorus directors to Directors College East and funded one youth quartet (and sponsor) to the Youth Harmony Festival held concurrently at Harmony College East. Continuing this long-standing tradition is only possible through generous and thoughtful giving by members and chapters of the district. While some contributions are made



directly, others result from those who elect the "donor choice" option as members of Ambassadors of Song and/or the Presidents Council.

Charity begins . . . at the M-AD Fall Convention!

Mid-Atlantic District Barbershoppers are among the most generous in the Society. We know that. It's a fact confirmed by Harmony Foundation (see the article above for the details). In addition to all other opportunities to support significant Society and District programs, those who attended the fall convention in Lancaster, Pa. October 1-3 gave of themselves and \$741 of their treasure. Here's how:

- Those who attended the dinner at the convention center on Saturday afternoon donated \$413.
- Those who attended the district House of Delegates meeting on Sunday morning donated \$287.
- Those who picked up free vinyl long-playing records (from the John Hohl collection) donated \$41.

What was it for? All for the benefit of the Mid-Atlantic District Endowment Fund. The proceeds of his fund — *your* fund — are used to send musical directors to M-AD's Directors College East and youth quartets (and a sponsor) to the Youth Harmony Camp, both of which are offered annually at Salisbury University in June. This year, five directors and one youth quartet received scholarships to attend. And let there be no mistake: good music, good musical direction, and enthusiastic youthful singers all guarantee a bright future.

Donations may be made at any time, for any purpose, or simply to give back for all the harmony in one's life. Those who participate in Harmony Foundation's Presidents Council or Ambassadors of Harmony giving programs may designate up to 30 percent of their gift to be returned to their chapter or to the district. That portion that comes back to the district is also added to the Endowment Fund principal (which is never touched). At this convention, Director of Major Gifts and a member of M-AD (among others) Sean Devine presented a check to us for \$2,486.46 — from those who exercised the "donor choice" option during the first half of this year.

All who contribute are to be congratulated as they are in the forefront of keeping barbershop harmony — this uniquely American musical genre — alive and well and growing in number and in popularity in the Mid-Atlantic District. As chair of the M-AD Endowment Fund Committee I give each of you my heart-felt thanks.

Notes for Chapter Treasurers, new and old

The New Year brings lots of activity for chapter treasurers. Hopefully you have a checklist of "Things to Do" in 2011. If not, the newly revised BHS Treasurer's Manual is an excellent place to start. New treasurers will find it to be an invaluable reference source. The "old hands" will find updated information on reporting requirements and a useful refresher of job responsibilities. If you attended one of the recent Leadership Academies, you should have received a hardcopy manual. Anyone can download and print the manual, templates and attachments from the Society website (www.barbershop.org). You don't even need to

sign in. Just click on the Documents link in the top menu bar and look under the Business and Finance header for the Chapter Treasurer link.

Section 1.2 of the manual has a very comprehensive To Do list. Here are the highlights for the first three months of the year (including a little catch up from December). My list focuses on external requirements (IRS, banking, BHS HQ), vs. internal requirements such as budget preparation (*you do create a budget, don't you?*).

DECEMBER

- Read the Treasurer's Manual
- Obtain necessary papers from your bank to effect signature changes due to changes in Treasurer and President (whoever you have as authorized check signers).

JANUARY

- Read into the Board minutes the names of persons authorized to handle money for the chapter (the Bond List).
- Have the President appoint a Financial Review committee
- If any individual or quartet received \$600 or more for services from the chapter in 2010 complete IRS Form 1099-MISC and mail to the recipient(s) by January 31.

FEBRUARY

• If you mailed any Forms 1099-MISC in January, file with the IRS Form **1096** together with copies of the 1099-MISC by February 28.

March

• Review the chapter's prior year (2009) Form **990-N**, **990EZ** or **990** and start preparing to file the 2010 990.

I will have more on the 990 filing in the next issue, but here are a few hints in the meantime:

- ✓ The 2010 Treasurer should prepare or help the current Treasurer prepare the 990 filing. He understands the data and can do the current Treasurer a favor by passing along his knowledge of how it was done previously.
 - ✓ There are instructions on the BHS website on how to file the various 990.
 - ✓ Most importantly, EVERY chapter has to file one of the 990 forms, based on your gross revenue. The filing is due by May 15.

As District Treasurer I'm available to answer your questions. Please feel free to use me as a resource. If I don't know the answer we also have a wealth of Leadership Academy Treasurer instructors and experienced chapter treasurers in the district. I look forward to talking with you. To everyone who attended this year, thanks for your interest and support; hope to see you next year. For those who missed, mark your calendar now – the Tuesday after Christmas.





Recruiting the Barbershopper

An age old dilemma and concern is: How can a chapter approach existing barbershoppers to join their group? Very frequently, the concern over "poaching" is raised and barbershop brass



is called upon for King Solomon-esque grace to bring peace. You might be surprised to know there are no formal rules to address situations where a vivacious chapter looks to invite current barbershoppers to join their ranks. Rather, we are guided by simple ideals of fraternity and harmony. I

offer the following thoughts as perhaps a guide to how a chapter can properly reach its target audience without offending other chapters.

Any solicitation *should* be generic. Offers to join a chapter, say, for a run at Internationals or a performance tour, can be made to all current barbershoppers. The intention should be to not interrupt the member's relationship with their current chapter. Instead, the member is being offered an opportunity to participate as a member of both chapters.

Solicitations *should not* be personal. One-on-one invitations to leave one chapter to join another may disrupt our inter-chapter harmony and fellowship. "Hey ____, you're such a great singer, you should really come sing with us instead of your current group." Chances are, "___" already knows there are other chapters in the area. Our customary welcoming nature would give him the opportunity to seek out a new chapter if he were so inclined.

With the advent of Facebook and email it is very easy to communicate upcoming guest events or open auditions. If you are not yet familiar, Facebook allows a group to schedule an event, like a Guest Night, and send invitations to friends and fans. I personally have received many invitations to Guest Nights simply because I am a fan of several chapters on Facebook. These are not personal solicitations aimed at me, rather, a generic advertisement of the event.

The Barbershop Harmony Society is a wonderful connection of chapters centered on our shared love of harmony and fellowship. We stay true to that camaraderie when we respect other chapters' membership and we approach recruiting current barbershoppers in a courteous manner. If you have concerns about such a difficult topic, please do reach out to your District leadership for guidance.

T he Nassau Mid-Island Chapter of the international Barbershop Harmony Society has launched a special program aimed at educating the general public and attracting new members through library exhibit facilities throughout Nassau County. "In our over 60 years serving the Nassau community, our fine chorus and quartets have had a long and gratifying history of performing in the county's fine libraries," noted John Brolly, Vice President for Chapter Development for the 67member organization. "It makes perfect sense that such focal points for education and learning continue to play such a major role in achieving awareness and widespread attention for this special art form and the observation of it. The use of exhibit space in our libraries further cements this strong association and spirit of cooperation."

Created by the chapteer's Public Relations Vice President Bob Heim, "Barbershop Behind the Glass" is intended as an easily movable exhibit.

One change this year won't affect many folks. For years, we have offered both Beginning Arranging and Intermediate/Advanced Arranging. It seemed to the people who taught the Intermediate/Advanced Arranging class that the students would be better served in a one-on-one setting. Therefore, students who want more information, or to get advice on their own arrangements can make an appointment in the HCE office to meet with a faculty member who can answer their questions and give them advice on arrangements. We have some of the top arrangers in the Society on staff, so help is at hand!

As you can see, there is something for YOU at HCE/DCE 2011. I can promise you a great time, and a great opportunity to learn more about this woderful hobby and how to perform it more effectively — and to have more fun doing it! I hope to see you all in Salisbury on the weekend of June 16-19.

So Now What Do I Do With This Song?

In this class you'll discuss how to take a song from "scratch:" and decide how to handle it vocally, visually, emotion. You'll develop a plan and discuss some rehearsal techniques to help members of the group perform the song to the plan. Some of the song elements you'll discuss are tuning, precision, handling rhythm, the use of emotion, and finding the "high points" of a song.

Emceeing


This tag was arranged by S.K. Grundy and sung most memorably by the Sundowners. We offer it to you as a perfect Valentine's treat.

Grundy coached many quartets and became one of the Society's best-known, most prolific and most respected arrangers.

With Grundy's coaching and arrangements, the Pitchikers won bronze medals in 1956 and '57, took the silver in '58, and the gold in 1959.

The Sundowners—5th Place in 1966, 4th Place in 1967, 4th Place in 1968, 3rd Place in 1969, 2nd Place in 1970 and 1971—is often cited as "one of the best quartets never to win the gold."
