With an infectiously exuberant rendition of a medley of Cole Porter tunes (*Let's Do It* and *Let's Misbehave*), the Voices of Gotham beat out The Big Apple chorus by just 6 points (1/3 point per judge, per song) to claim their first district championship. In less than four years since their chartering, VoG has appeared twice as mic-testers at International, and now earns their first appearance as outright district champion, representing the M-AD next July in Portland, Ore.

"We are so thrilled to be the representatives to Portland and we will do everyone proud. This really was a life-changing experience for our chapter and I can only see even bigger things coming from this moment. Thank you for all of the support the District has and continues to give us. We are proud members of the M-AD!" said Chapter President Braden Lynk.

The Big Apple Chorus registered a score of 80.0 with a stirring set that brought the hall to their feet, and third place was taken by the Chorus of the Chesapeake with a score of 77.2. Filling out the top five spots were Five Towns College with a score of 73.7 and Lansdale with a score of 73.1.

Congratulations to all these fine choruses and all those who competed in Lancaster. It was a wonderful chorus contest.

MAD Hatters captured the quartet championship with a score of 77.8, coming from behind after the first round to best Frank the Dog who came in second with a score of 77.3. Limelight grabbed third place with a score of 76.3. The top five spots were filled out by Mayhem with a score of 75.2 and Flatiron Four with a score of 74.5. We expect all of these quartets and more to appear at the PreSEVENTH!

Youth In Harmony adjudications set for January and March

t's time to notify all music educators in your area that their boys' and girl's quartets (four members, single gender) and ensembles (five+ members, single gender) can show off their barbershop singing and performance skills at the upcoming Mid-Atlantic District Youth In Harmony Adjudica-

tions.

These events are fun for the participants and audience, and great opportunities for you and/ or your chapter to get involved with your local educational organizations (public and private schools, and home-school organizations).

Simply notify the music educators and coordinators in your area of this opportunity for their young men and women to show their barbershop prowess and/ or simply give singing barbershop harmony a try. You can then become their "champion" by providing music, musical guidance, coaching, financial aid and other means of support to them as they prepare for participation in the preliminary adjudications.

Time is short for groups to prepare

for the adjudications so getting the word out about these events as soon as possible is critical. There will be two rounds of adjudications in early 2012: two "preliminary" events and a subsequent "finals" event six weeks later.

The two "preliminary" adjudication dates are scheduled for Saturday, January 14, 2012, in the Harrisburg, Pa. area, and Saturday, January 21, 2012, in the Richmond, Va. area. Performances at both "preliminary" adjudications will begin at approximately noon and, depending on the number of participating groups, will conclude by 1 or 1:30 p.m.

Following the adjudication performances, each of the participating quartets/ensembles will receive evaluations with the judges in each of the three adjudication categories (music, presentation and singing). Participants will be adjudicated by Barbershop Harmony Society (BHS) judges using the M-AD Youth In Harmony Adjudication rules along with the BHS contest rules and scoring rubrics. BHS contest rules can be found at: http://www.barbershop.org/competitions/contest-a-judging-system.html.

Quartets and ensembles achieving a rating of Excellent (50-59%), Outstanding (60-69%) or Superior (70-100%) will be invited to participate in the second round adjudication (Finals), which will take place on March 10, 2012, in Reston, Va., the same location and

date as the M-AD International Quartet Preliminary contest.

Each participating school will receive a participation plaque and a donation from the Mid-Atlantic District in the amount of \$100 payable to the school's/educational organization's choral music program. Each educational institution/organization/school will only receive one \$100 donation, regardless of the number of participating groups sent from that institution/organization/school.

Quartets and ensembles achieving a rating of Superior at the March "Finals" adjudication will earn a full scholarship (scholarships cover the tuition, room and board for 4 students and one music educator/chaperone) to the Youth In Harmony camp held in conjunction with the M-AD Harmony College East, scheduled for June 14-17, 2012, in Salisbury, Md. Likewise, quartets and ensembles earning a rating of "Outstanding" receive a ¾ tuition scholarship and those earning a rating of "Excellent" receive a ½ scholarship.

Details, rules and registration materials for the "preliminary" adjudications are available on the M-AD website and, when completed, should be returned, by the posted deadline of two weeks before the event, to Gary Plaag, VP Youth In Harmony, via email at gplaagbhs@gmail.com, or via US Mail at 4727 Timber Ridge Drive, Montclair, VA 22025.

Collegiate Scholarships available to attend Atlantic Harmony Brigade

When it comes to a commitment to quartet encouragement, especially with regard to the next new generation, M-AD'S Atlantic Harmony Brigade puts its money where its mouth is.

Since its inception in 2006 the AHB has made \$10,000 in contributions to various programs designed for young musician, including:

- \$3,000 to the Harmony Foundation,
- \$6,000 to Wilmington's Concord High School's Music Dept. as well as

• providing past scholarship valued at over \$1,000 to uniquely qualified collegiate singers who did not otherwise have the means to attend the AHB's "eXtreme Quartetting ™ weekend convention.

As announced at the Mid-Atlantic District Convention, with their \$1,000 annual donation to the Harmony Foundation, the

AHB's is now going beyond it usual philanthropic support by offering ten free full scholarships to attend the 2012 AHB rally to qualified men age 18-22, who show special promise as quartetters even if they have not

been in a quartet or are members of BHS! This translates into an additional \$ 3,000 commitment to youth in quartet harmony.

The AHB's mission goes beyond music support and providing a venue for fun, singing and general barbershop fraternity and mayhem. It serves the Society through its focus on quartetting as an exercise in higher-level intermediary quality quartet singing.

Face it, there are many talented young singers who would rise to the occasion to mix it up in many quartet combinations

and with lots of other good, well prepared quartetters. The AHB provides a chance and challenges their development.

Last year the AHB gave away four collegiate scholarships to two Canadians, one M-ADman and one Texan. Their participation was so well received that the AHB dedicated the additional funds for ten scholarships for 2012.

In fact, one of last year's scholarship recipients (**Seth Bockneck**, from Ontario) was such a good and well-prepared singer and so enthusiastically embraced the program he won the coveted award for *The Guy Everyone Was Glad They Sang With* (an award whose past recipients include **Eddie Holt** and **Tim Waurick**).

While the high standards and expectations the AHB is known for, will not be lowered for Scholarship invitees, the fees will be waived and the bar for admission will be modified to accommodate a few select singers whose applications (in lieu of quartet experience) show substantive alternative musical experience and/or training with credible references or mentoring sponsorship and a history of discipline and integrity.

Carnegie Hall will be producing a free USA-Japan Goodwill Concert on Monday, December 26, which will feature a youth Barbershop Chorus comprised of male singers up to age 30 from all over the US and Canada, under the direction of **Joe Cerutti** of the **Alexandria Harmonizers**.

Also performing will be **Prestige**, 2011 International Collegiate Quartet Champions, **Tim Waurick** of **Vocal Spectrum** fame, plus many other guests.

The concert will also feature a joint performance with the youth chorus and a three-time gold medal 100-piece youth orchestra from Japan. You will also be participating in a worthy charitable cause, since even though the concert is free, Carnegie Hall is producing this show as a fund-raiser for the victims of the earthquake and tsunamis that struck Japan this year, and donations will be accepted.

Leadership Academies & Ebiz



There have been many 9-11 remembrances across the country this year and many barbershop chapters have participated in them.

Members of the **Freehold Chapter** turned out again this year for the annual "Walk With Joe." The memorial 5K walk is held at the Monmouth Battlefield State Park, Manalapan, N.J. to honor **Patrick "Joe" Driscoll**, a member of the Freehold Chapter, who was on Flight 93 when it crashed in Shanksville, Pa. The event drew well over 1,300 people last year and this year it was even better attended.

The Freehold Chapter has been singing at this event ever since it started.

Patrick "Joe" Driscoll, a Manalapan resident for 35 years, was children

killed September 11, 2001, aboard United Airlines Flight #93 in the attack on America.

A great athlete and outdoorsman, Joe was heading to Yosemite National Park in California for his annual hiking trip when terrorists hijacked Flight # 93.

Joe and his wife Maureen were looking forward to celebrating their 44th wedding anniversary that year. He was a father of four

children and had five grandchildren.

As a member of the U.S. Navy, Joe served on the USS Power during the Korean War. He graduated first in his class from the New York University School of Engineering and earned a Master's Degree in Computer Science from Rutgers University.

Joe retired from Bellcore as Executive Director of Software Development.

As a member of The Yorktowne Club, a community benevolent organization located in Manalapan, Joe spent countless hours coaching sports, teaching and giving back to his community. As many of his family and friends have come to say, "Joe lived as a hero. It is no surprise he died as one."

We honor Joe and carry on the giving he did so freely. Joe Driscoll was a true gift to us all.

During the next eight months, both chapters will need to raise a substantial amount of money and we all need to help in any way we can.

By the time this is published, we will have completed our Northern Division Leadership Academy and we thank the instructors who gave their time to come to share their knowledge with all our officers for 2012.

Lastly, I am pleased to announce the addition of two new Chapter Counselors. Mark Bentley of Hunterdon County, N.J., a 49 year member, will be working with Morris County and Rahway Valley Chapters and Vinnie Colonna of Nassau Mid-Island will be working with Five Towns College and Western Suffolk chapters. We thank them for offering to help their fellow barbershoppers.

Lastly, I continue to emphasize the importance of an ongoing membership recruiting program. Every member must be a part of the membership committee for his chapter and every week needs to be a "Guest Night". Each of us should carry chapter information cards with us at all times so we are prepared to give to a prospect we meet during the week. Get his name, call him, offer to pick him up, and take him to your meeting. Chapters, send out weekly e-mails reminding members to bring a guest.

THE DOCTOR IS IN



(Second in a series)


n the Spring issue of *Mid'l Antics*, I encouraged you to affirm and act on your "primary purpose," to do all you can as an individual to contribute to the health of your chapter. I encouraged you to acknowledge that the fundamental vehicle for enabling our personal satisfaction in barbershop and contributing to the Society's worthy goal to enlist into our ranks countless men who love to sing is a healthy chapter! A healthy chapter--Your Chapter--should have refreshing and challenging musical activity powered by competent music leadership, opportunities for service in your community, chances to engage your mind in educational opportunities and management and administrative roles,

and an atmosphere in which families and friends can socialize and support each other.

It's pretty clear how a healthy chapter environment, with all these positive traits, can enhance your personal experience in barbershop. But it may not be clear how the traits of a healthy chapter directly contribute to encouragement of men who love to sing to join with us and grow our Society at large. We may just be "too close," or even too comfortable, in our chapter environment to see with fresh eyes how our chapters are perceived by folks "outside."

chapter meeting, experienced one of our performances in the community, or simply engaged me in conversation about my barbershop activity, openly expressing their perception of our group and, often as a sidebar, of barbershop singing in general.

I've found these to be great opportunities for "active listening," to hear another person's perspective of what we do and who we are! I often remind myself of this visual "chuckle," the view of Mount Rushmore from "the other side," to place myself in the other person's shoes for a moment and see how our chapter -- and our art form,



A Fresh Perspective

Clever, eh? But...food for thought, I'd offer! As this "barbershop year" draws to a close, I'm touched by the countless times I've been approached by folks who have either visited our

by association -- is perceived.

Here are some examples with which you might identify to help you determine whether the perception others experience when they come in contact with your chapter is sufficiently positive to make a difference in their lives... or even encourage them to join you!

Internal Health

There are countless ways our "internal health," the way we operate and behave when we're "among ourselves" is perceived by visitors.

One example of the influence of a chapter's "internal health" is the reaction of a former member who visits "on a lark" to recall a taste of his past activity in barbershop. My chapter, D.C., had the pleasure of experiencing this example recently when a visitor to our chapter meeting greeted me as he arrived by telling me he'd been a proud member of our group in the 70's, prior to my becoming the Chorus Director.

He was warmly greeted by our fellows, encouraged throughout the evening to join in our (seated) singing with his slightly-worn-but-still-sweet voice, and entertained by a brief "performance" of our repertoire, as if it were "just for him." The result? He continued to visit off and on for several months, and even rallied to join with other guests when we sang the National Anthem at Nationals Park! Throughout, I noted his sparkling eyes and willing spirit as he "played" along with us; maybe even a bit more "spring" in his step!

After a few months, though, he approached me to inform me that, as much as he'd enjoyed his recent engagements with us (without qualification!), he'd decided that age and distance would prevent him from regular attendance and re-joining us full time. Instead, he handed me an envelope with a note and a very

generous check. It read, simply, "Here's a small token of the pleasure you've given me in being among you. Please use it to continue the fine work that you do." Wow. A benefactor (and we all need these), once a member.

A second example involves a Society member from out of the area, visiting for business or pleasure. We are fortunate to have a regular visitor to our chapter who is a member of the award-winning Toronto Northern Lights Chorus, whose business trips bring him to the D.C. area about once a month. Of all the chapters in our area, we consider it a measure of our "internal health" that this fellow chooses to call D.C. his "barbershop home away from home," always greeted warmly by our guys, encouraged to sing with us (and teach us some things, too!), and attend our performances when he's in the area. He has, through both action and words, shared with us a clear sense that our "internal health" warrants his loyalty and active participation.

First things first

Finally, our "internal health" can be — and is, more often than we realize!--measured by

family members and "significant others" who visit with us and observe what we do and how we interact with each other. A new member of ours, completely new to barbershop but



ready to perform, outfitted, and competing with us in our recent District contest! At that contest his wife confided in me that this was one of the "best things" that could happen for him...them, too!...that he could find something he enjoyed, could learn from, and be comfortable doing, even with some physical limitations about which she was very concerned. Aware of his limitations, we'd made every accommodation to insure his time spent with us was not only enjoyable but worry free. She expressed--as he has done countless times--her thanks for our care.

External Health

Just as "internal health" is the measure of a chapter's fitness on the "inside," "external health" is the perception garnered by public appearances at community performances, annual shows and other service activities. any chapters like ours make a point of "taking the temperature" of our patrons

by several means when we're in the public eye.

We include a program insert soliciting written comments on our performances, we make a point of populating the lobbies following our performances to genuinely greet and thank our patrons, and we listen carefully to the remarks--positive and negative — to gauge how we might improve ourselves and thus our "public's" experience.

Fact is, many of our patrons know little or nothing about "the Society," other than it had (at one time, at least!) an unpronounceable acronym for a name! But they do care, and are vested, in a sense, in us as a chapter, as they've been witness to our performance.

Are they entertained with quality singing, family-friendly dialogue and engaging energy? Are they greeted and thanked for their patronage? Are they encouraged to spread the word about our chapter to other future patrons...and even future members?

Presuming we continually strive for quality performance in public, we should both solicit and monitor public reaction to determine our "external health." We needn't be haughty or "full of ourselves" in doing so. People want to share their views if genuinely solicited! And we need to respond with

graciousness, and then review at a later time with our leadership the "pros and cons" of these reactions to do better next time, right? Of course right!

No more is this true than when engaging with young people either through performances or other school community activities. With more and more popular exposure of *a cappella* music (NBC's "The Sing Off," for example) on TV and college campuses,

we are finding increased enthusiasm for groups like ours, exhibiting musical skill and high energy regardless of OUR

age, when we perform for a younger audience.

Our chapter has collaborated with a local high school for six years to produce an "a cappella festival," where all the school's ensembles perform all a cappella pieces, including barbershop, and our chorus performs brief sets in each of two acts, including appearances by a small ensemble or quartets.

I'm confident to these healthy examined the set of the set o

We join for a joint "finale," Joe Liles' lovely "Let There Be Music," and always receive a standing ovation from student patrons and families. Always.

Just this week, young people flocked around our "veteran" singers

following the show — as they do each year — to learn tags and spend time singing. And, you guessed it, students from that high school have continued

to sing throughout college and visited local chapters close to school while away from home.

Who knows? Maybe our "external health" was "catching" enough that we'll see them as members of our chapter in the near future!

Take it from me, a parent and educator, kids "see through" the veneer of performance. They see energy, life, and enjoyment generated by our simple performances. The reaction of youth, likely rarely exposed to art like ours or adult fraternal activity we enjoy, is palpable. It's a real measure of our "external health."

Helping you fulfill your Primary Purpose

I'm confident that, as you review these healthy examples, you can identify things your chapter does to contribute to its health and work to do them even better. Or perhaps you might consider whether the results

Breath support. Cures pitch problems! dure for the notes A, B, C, and D. The consulted a vocal pathologist, a dure for the notes A, B, C, and D.

V critical concerns for any director. You want all of your chorus members to have a healthy voice and sing in tune, right? Of course.



But do you know for sure that it's happening? Well, the in-tune singing part is easy. You can hear it at every rehearsal.

Vocal health, however, isn't so obvious.

You may not know if one of your singers suffers from vocal distress simply because directors rarely work with their singers on an individual basis.

But if you have much of the former (poor tuning), then many of your singers may well be suffering from the latter (poor vocal health). The two are intimately related. In fact, since both are caused by the same prior condition, attending to vocal health will help your chorus sing in tune.

Let me first say a few words about un-healthy voices.

Here are some questions you should ask your members as they leave the chapter meeting:

- Does your voice feel "raspy" or "tired" or "uncomfortable"?
- Did your voice "give out" during

• Did you have trouble hitting high and low notes that you normally sing with ease?

If any of your men answers "yes" to any of these questions, you, as director, may wish to incorporate a vocal health program (see below).

Here's the "prior condition" that links vocal health to in-tune singing - breath support. Although vocal distress is perhaps the more dramatic manifestation of poor breath support, singing flat is no less a consequence. In fact, poor tonality may be a more certain sign of poor breath support than a raspy throat.

Yes, of course, tuning problems are experienced in just about every chorus, and, yes, things other than vocal distress can contribute – fatique, poor vowel match, age, oversinging, undershooting the pitch when modulating up the scale, or overshooting when going down, collapsing the resonance space, and so forth.

But if your singers go flat, don't look for excuses; don't say it's just their poor voices. Teach them to sing with energy and with great breath support and you'll have significantly fewer problems with pitch. And, of course, they won't suffer from vocal fatigue.

Why does striving to achieve good breath support solve your tuning and vocal stress issues? It's because your singers won't have to muscle their sound, and that means two things their tone won't be distorted (e.g., flat) and their vocal apparatus won't tire.

Here's a way to develop great breath support.

Many of us know Brian Barford, the astute singing judge and coach from Ohio. What some folks in BHS may not know is that Brian's wife, Jean, is an extraordinary barbershopper in her own right. In fact, having won an SAI quartet gold medal (Sounds of Music, 1974), and five chorus gold medals over her 40-year career as the Director of the Gem City chorus, there are few people, if any, in all of barbershopping with better credentials.

A few decades ago, however, Jean **Barford** was suffering from serious vocal distress. She could barely speak; her singing career was in jeopardy.

Dr. Stemple, at St. Elizabeth Hospital in Dayton, for help. He created an exercise program that not only cured Jean of her vocal issues, but also provided a means for achieving terrific breath support.

Ever since, Jean has touted this program as a way of developing the needed breath support for good singing and for maintaining vocal health.

Here's the plan. It takes about 10 minutes to complete.

I. WARM-UP

Sustain the sound "Ee" as softly as possible on middle C. The goal is 45 seconds with an uninterrupted tone flow.

II. STRETCHING

Slowly glide from your lowest note to your highest note on the sound "Oh" as softly as possible. Then slowly glide from your highest to your lowest note on the sound "Oh" as softly as possible. The goal is no voice breaks.

III. POWER

Sustain the sound "Oh" as softly as possible on G (below middle C) for 45 seconds with an uninterrupted tone flow. Don't worry if you can't make it all the way; you'll improve as time goes on. Then repeat this same proce-

The key is that each exercise should be done twice every day, as softly as possible (like a whisper). The softer the better. Including this exercise in your rehearsal warm-up is a good way to get your guys started on an individualized program of voice training.

I have used it with my chorus and I can assure you it works incredibly well. At first, many singers were barely able to go 20 seconds, but after using the program for a while, their breath control was strengthened to an amazing degree. The program works, of course, only if taken seriously outside of rehearsal time.

A few years ago I made a CD of these exercises. The notes and timing are provided, as are the instructions. All you need to do is to pop it into your CD player and sing away.

If you have an interest in Jean Barford's breath support exercises, then send an email to me (giving your name and address), and I'll be happy to send you a copy of the CD, which you can then legally duplicate for your chorus members.

Remember: Awesome breath support leads to awesome singing (and no vocal distress). So give Jean's program a try in your chapter.

ANNUAL SHOWS

think 'standing ovation' as you prepare for your

here are so many things to consider in preparation for your annual show or your holiday performance. There are the script, actors, songs, copyright issues, licensing issues, guest performers, ticket sales, program, venue, afterglow, and lots of other details. Yes, a lot of time and energy goes into the preparation of a show and rightly so. For many of you it is one of your largest money raising events of the year. Wouldn't it be great if your show was so good that when your patrons leave your venue, they involuntarily utter; "I can't wait 'til the next show!"

How will you know whether your performance was good, great or just OK? I have participated in about 30 annual shows/holiday shows with my chapter. I have yet to have anyone say anything but how they "enjoyed the show" and how "it was the best show yet"... it is hard, if not impossible to make any significant conclusions from the comments that we get from most of our patrons – they LOVE us and they LOVE the time that they spend with us during our performances (even when we know deep down that our performance was not as solid as we hoped). This is especially true of our friends and family, which in some instances is the bulk of the audience. With all of the time and energy that we put into producing a show, doesn't it make sense to determine what worked really well and don't you think it appropriate to develop a plan for fixing what did not work as well as we intended?

If that makes sense, how will you get some unbiased feedback


about your shows so that you can make a good experience for your patrons even better? For example, how will you learn whether parking was convenient? Whether it was easy to enter and exit your hall where your show is held? How will you know if there was easy access to rest rooms or whether the lighting in the auditorium was adequate? Who will tell you if the seating and temperature inside the auditorium were comfortable?

How will you know if your song selection had enough variety and interest? How will you know whether the quality of singing was where you would like it to be? That is, who will provide feedback on whether the chorus and quartets knew their words and notes, started their songs with confidence, performed the songs with excitement and energy or whether the chorus generally had a nice overall blend without individual voices sticking out?

Who will let you know relatively simple things like; did the chorus/quartets enter and exit the stage effectively and whether any speaking parts in your show were appropriate and worked well? How will you know if the costuming added to the performance and if you had guest performers, whether they added to the overall performance? How will you know if your overall performance package was entertaining and enjoyable?

If you don't have an answer to some of these questions I would strongly urge you to consider having a STANDING OVATION review. A reviewer will attend your show and answer many if not all of the questions that I have posed above. He/she will provide your chapter (typically the music team) with feedback in a positive manner and all feedback is private – the information is shared only with you.

Here is what you would need to do – send a note to me ijako-vac@comcast.net or to Bill Colosimo, billcatps@aol.com who is the M-AD Standing Ovation Program coordinator. All you need to do is to request a review and include information about when and where your show is being held. With a month's notice we can assign someone to review your show and offer feedback which I know you will find helpful in making your next show even more entertaining. Your responsibilities include providing show tickets and expenses (typically mileage) to the reviewer. Please take advantage of this awesome program. I am confidant that you will find it to be of significant value for you and your group.

Barbershoppers came through at the District Fall Convention in Lancaster. On Friday night, the District "First Lady," Roxanne Powell, invited guests attending a get-together after the quartet semi-finals to show off their baking skills (or that of their favorite bake shop) by bringing a baked dessert delicacy. Monetary donations for individual slices were designated to benefit the M-AD Endowment Fund. The winning culinary (and financial) contribution was a Pennsylvania Dutch Pecan Pie baked and donated by **Dee Trube**, adding \$33 to the total collected (\$156). Now that's hearty eating and generous giving!

And at the House of Delegates meeting on Sunday morning, Harmony Foundation CEO, Clarke Caldwell, presented checks to chapter representatives and to the district. These checks represented a portion (up to 30 percent) of contributions made by individuals who also selected the "Donor Choice" option. The check to the district (and further designated for deposit to the M-AD Endowment Fund) totaled just over \$2,970. We are grateful to the 39 men who asked that some portion of their contribution to the President's Council or Ambassadors of Song be returned to the district.

In addition, the HOD delegates dug deep and set a record for donations by contributing \$400 to the M-AD Endowment Fund.

In summary, it was a banner weekend for your Endowment Fund. A total of \$3,526 was added to the Fund, bringing it close to \$90,000. What this means is that the interest and dividends generated by the fund will allow additional scholarships to be available for youth quartets to attend the Youth Harmony Festival at Harmony College East and musical directors (and wannabees) to attend Directors College at HCE and, possibly, at Harmony University.

Thanks to all who so generously and thoughtfully donate to preserve and perpetuate barbershop harmony for future generations!

WINTER WONDERLAND

Music by Felix Bernard • Lyrics by Dick Smith -- 1934


Winter Wonderland was by far the best effort of lyricist **Richard B. Smith** (1901-1935) and of composer **Felix Bernard** (1897-1944). Ironically, neither man had the opportunity to savor the sweet rewards of their 1934 song. Dick Smith died the very next year, and Felix Bernard did not live much longer, passing away about ten years later.

Felix Bernard, was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., in 1897. His father was a professional violinist and he took up the piano, later performing on the vaudeville circuit as a tap dancer.

Bernard, the composer of Winter Wonderland also co-wrote the melody of the 1919 hit, **Dardanella** (the recording by **Ben Selvin's Novelty Orchestra** is believed to be the first record in history to sell one million copies).

Fifteen years later, in 1934, he teamed up with lyricist, Dick Smith to write Winter Wonderland, which was an immediate hit for **Guy Lombardo** and **His Royal Canadians Orchestra** during the 1934 holiday season. The Guy Lombardo recording of Winter Wonderland reached the number two position on the Hit Parade.

Then, in 1946 (two years after Bernard's death), rival recordings were made by **Perry Como** and **The Andrews Sisters** (backed by Guy Lombardo) which established the bubbly tune as a Yuletide favorite.
