Signs of Things to Come?

any people don't realize that the Mid-Atlantic District is one of only five districts in the Society that has divisions. We are so large, with over 90 chapters and many quartets that we need to have divisions to provide administrative and musical services to all of our members and chapters. Over time, the number of divisions and the alignment of chapters within divisions have shifted to reflect changes in the locations and sizes of our chapters. In the recent past we have also combined division conventions to account for participation trends, to ensure the district remains financially solvent, and to ensure that contestants and audiences alike have a fun-filled and rewarding experience.

For most of us, the one time all year we get to experience the "wider world of barbershop" is when we attend one of the annual division contests and conventions used to select quartets and choruses that will advance to our district contest & convention every fall. This year, as we have done several times in the recent past, we combined two divisions (Northern and Western) and held three total division conventions between the middle of May and the first weekend in June. While the Atlantic and Southern Division conventions were modest in size, the combined Northern & Western division convention with 34 quartets and 23 choruses and just under 700 men crossing the stage rivaled most Society district conventions both in size and quality of performances.

The results of the 2015 division contest cycle were interesting to say the least. A total of fifty-four quartets made the plunge and posted an average score of 66. Forty-six choruses appeared representing 50 percent of our chapters and posted an average score of 64.7. Of those choruses posting a score of 67 or higher for automatic qualification to the fall district contest, the average score was 72.6!

And included in the chorus totals are three new choruses that were appearing in their first division contest. Those three choruses put an average of 23 men on stage and registered an average score of 79.0! One of them finished second in their division by one point. Not one percentage but one, single, solitary point. Another sang "out of division" for evaluation only.

And one won their division championship outright. That is astounding!

What is even more dramatic is the nature of these new chapters/choruses. They are not just about competition. They will attract new men (young and old) to the joys of barbershop music and the benefits of barbershop fellowship. And they will become a respected and influential voice in their local arts community and share the many organizational, leadership, and musical strengths of our Society to the betterment of all.

Elsewhere in this issue of Mid'l Antics you will read about the specific details of each division convention. But as you read keep in mind that we are witnessing the beginning of a resurgence of barbershop singing in our district, our communities, and our society. And these beginnings are the fruit of the hard work and dedication each of you has put in to keeping barbershop alive in your chapters, your communities, and your lives. Thank you one and all!

Of course, the afterglows (ours wasn't the only one, but it was probably the only one with a marriage proposal) were just the culmination of a wonderful weekend of singing and competing. (They are not always the same thing). According to Gary Plaag, more than 260 people crossed the stage and, presumably, most of them also sang! If you care about the results you probably already know them, but for the record:

Choruses: The Virginians (Richmond) became the Southern Division Chorus Champion with their renditions of the John Sebastian's What a Day for a Daydream and a Good Day/Wonderful Day medley. (I guess they never had to make up their mind.) The Chorus of the Old Dominion (Loudoun County) finished second, and there was a tie for third place between the Harrisonburg Harmonizers and the Virginia Gentlemen from Roanoke Valley.

The **Southern Mix** from La Plata was the AA Plateau Champion (inexplicitly disappearing before the Show of Champions), and the **Arlingtones** were the A Plateau Champion. The **Singing Capital Chorus** from the District of Columbia was Most Improved Chorus.

Both Richmond and Loudoun County qualified for the District Contest in Ocean City, and it is likely that several other Southern Division choruses will also qualify once the results are in from the Western/ Northern District Convention. (By the time you are reading this, you will probably know which ones.)

Quartets: Forecast blew everyone away with a score of 75.4. Youth Reclamation Project finished second. YRP also finished first in the Seniors category, even though those guys seem to get younger every year – their project must be succeeding. LoCo-4 finished third – fyi, LoCo refers to their location (Loudoun County), not their menta capacity!

Brothers in Arms finished first in the collegiate category with a score of 73.3, second only to

Forecast.

Misfire won the novice quartet competition in a squeaker.

District qualifiers will be determined after all division results are known.

So, what was it like being host chapter?

In a word, awesome! I had the honor of being the host chapter coordinator, and for much of the weekend it was the easiest job of all.

Why?

Because we have an incredible chapter, where everyone – chapter members (Jubil-Aires) and our spouses and significant others (Jubil-Ladies) - volunteers to fill the needs, often before being asked. It's not just the folks in red shirts you saw distributing tickets, staffing the doors, escorting performers, or providing TLC to the judges. It's the ones you didn't see - setting up the stage at 8 a.m. Friday, taking judges to Dulles Airport at 6 a.m. Sunday, or doing heavy labor to strike the set after the Show of Champions (when one would rather be partying).

And we had friends.

Colleagues from Loudoun and the Harmony
Heritage Singers helped out Saturday morning
while our chorus was warming up and singing on
stage. The Dundalk chapter provided the
risers, including ones needed in the Ready
Room. And most of all, the District Events
Team is amazing. Walt and Gary are fabulous
to work with and great problem-solvers as well
as leaders. Working with Roger and Bob in
the ticket booth is always a pleasure. And then
there are the folks who set up and take down the
stage – if this was a rock concert, we'd call them
"roadies." Let me quote one of our members:

"When Fred declared that we would have to break the set completely, including not just risers but curtains, shell carpet etc. etc., I told Ceda not to look for me until midnight. There was a huge

amount of work to do and we didn't know how to do half of it. BUT the district has a professional crew to do that and really only needed our participation. They calmly taught us how to do various tasks while doing a lot of the work themselves. Had they not been there to show us how, we might have still been staring at the shell sections wondering how to break them down. As it turned out, we had plenty of time to get to the hospitality room . . ."

We can't wait to do it again!

Were there any glitches?

Of course. But only one merits comment, because it affects future decisions. This year, for the first time, the District required performers and audience members to wear wristbands. This procedure was intended to prevent people from abusing the system by using one ticket to admit more than one person. How often does this happen? No one knows, because there is no "audit trail" to detect violations. Or to disprove them.

Is wearing a wristband a major burden? Of course not. So almost everyone followed the procedure whether or not they thought it necessary. But a small number resisted - perhaps because they thought the green wristband would "distract" from their costume, perhaps because they feel our society has become too rule bound (remember why O.C. Cash eschewed three-letter organization abbreviations when he named SPEBSQSA), perhaps because they wanted to assert their independence.

More troublesome, some leaders who should have known better told their colleagues not to follow the rule. The unfortunate result was that our door monitors, who give of their time (and generally sacrifice seeing the performances), faced some unpleasantness that could have and should have been avoided. They deserved better. Walt did an excellent job of resolving the wristband issue and taking the heat off the door staff, but it's a problem that should not have happened.

So what should be done in the future? Are wristbands an important and easy fix, or is it a solution in search of a problem? This is just one man's opinion, but I lean toward the latter. It is possible that without wristbands there may be lost revenue from violations. But probably not much – in my experience, most barbershoppers are law-abiding folks. (After all, we all "pay to play," because we recognize that it costs the District money to put on a convention and provide other support, and that we all benefit from its doing so.) I think it's troublesome when an institution institutes a policy that sends a message to its members or customers that it doesn't trust them. Before we send that message, I think there should be a higher burden of showing that there really is a problem.

But that is just one man's opinion. And it is dwarfed by the good feeling that comes out of an event like the Southern Division Convention. Not to mention an accepted proposal!





Northern Division choruses rock **Cherry Hill** convention

s I joined the convention activities Saturday morning at the Crowne Plaza Hotel it was clearly evident that it was chorus competition day. The excitement level had been raised several notches and the number of people now swarming the hotel lobby had more than doubled.

It was definitely time for chorus competing convention attendees to don their chapters colors and bring their "A" game. For some their call time was 7:00 a.m., with an earlier wakeup call if you wanted breakfast. But this was not a challenge for these seasoned singers who were anxious to show off their polished packages for a very appreciative audience.

The first of 23 competing choruses and one chorus competing "for evaluation

only" hit the stage promptly at 8:55 a.m. Just under 700 singers would ultimately cross the stage to entertain the audience and impress an experienced triple panel of judges.

From this spectators' vantage point all choruses acquitted themselves admirably. Each contestant was vying for a chance to compete for the district championship in Ocean City this coming October and earn the right to represent the M-AD in the 2016 International Chorus contest in Nashville, Tenn.

When all was said and done, six northern division choruses qualified for the fall district convention. And the new Philadelphia chorus also qualified, singing out of division.

The **Big Apple Chorus** is our Plateau AAAA champion and 2015 Northern Division Champion edging out **East** Coast Sound from Caldwell, N.J. (newly chartered) by just one point! That's right. Not one percentage, but just one single, solitary point. Third place honors were garnered by the Westchester **Chordsmen**. The Teaneck, N.J. **Blue Chip Chorus** is the Northern Division Plateau AA Champion. The Montclair, N.J. Dapper **Dan's of Harmony** is the Northern Division Plateau AAA Champion. And the Allentown-Bethlehem, Pa. Lehigh Valley **Harmonizers** earned the Most Improved trophy.

Coach Jeff helps Teaneck discover renewed vocal energy

he new HIP (Harmony Infusion Program) is humming along. I am really delighted to report that a second District Coach has been named – **Jeff Glemboski**, the bass of **'Round Midnight** and the Musical Director of the **Five Towns College** chapter on Long Island.

Recently, Jeff coached the **Teaneck, N.J. chapter**, primarily on vocal production skills. According to **Lou Ponte**, the long-term director of Teaneck:

Jeff worked with the chorus on generic vocal techniques – opening up the soft palate, tall sound, control with support/breathing, etc. In addition, he worked with the chorus on specific contest numbers – opening lines/tuning, section unit sound, energizing words and phrases.

The evening was a huge success. As Lou related:

The feedback I received immediately after the session leads me to believe I can expect a great deal of progress with the chorus as a result of this coaching.

- (a) Email me (rtarpy@verizon.net)to indicate that you would like your chorus to participate. We'll set a date on which you'd like to have the coaching, and settle on the type of coaching you'd like to receive. Remember that you can choose among coaches who focus on the "Administrative" or leadership aspects of your chapter, basic singing-skills, or "performance packages."
- (b) I'll recruit an appropriate person to serve as District Coach and let you know who he is.
- (c) Then, enjoy your coaching session at the appointed time, take a few digital photos so that your session can be featured in an upcoming issue of *Mid'l Antics*, and fill in a very short report that will help us evaluate and improve the program.

MAS

Most everyone knows that MAD subsidizes a coaching program (called the Musical Assistance Service – MAS) that serves both quartets and chapters. It has been very ably managed, for many years, by its coordinator Chuck Lower.

The idea is that a quartet or chorus arranges to meet with a coach of their choosing, after which Chuck reimburses the coach, up to \$75, for expenses.



Thinking About Dear Ol' Dad

As we mark Father's Day 2015, a few website links have been unearthed for this regular column expressing such filial connections. We start by suggesting you listen to the pioneering foursome that went under the name American Quartet and recorded for a number of companies between 1899 and 1925. Here they sing I Want a Girl on an early 78 rpm disk.
